The Continentals under Gen. "Mad Anthony" Wayne made a midnight attack and in 10 minutes the fortifications had fallen into the hands of the attackers.

Morale of the entire nation, which had been at low ebb prior to the victory, was aroused and brought about a successful culmination of the war, the speaker pointed out.

## UNION LABOR GROUP BACKS HOUSING BILL

Endorsement of the Wagner-Bogen federal housing bill was made by the Utica Trades Assembly at the Labor Temple last night.

Stella Humphrey and Michael J. Walsh, delegates to the Senate bearing on federal youth labor amendment in Albany Nov. 21, reported they rendered an unanimous endorsement of the WPA educational group.
