N. G. Powers, Utica Lawyer, Dies at Age 73

Nicholas G. Powers, 73, well known local attorney, died in Faxon Hospital, Aug. 14, 1958, after an illness of one year.

He was born in Port Leyden March 12, 1885, and came to Utica 60 years ago. He attended the old Advanced School and then was graduated from Utica Free Academy. He went to Albany Law School and was admitted to the bar in 1911.

He occupied an office for many years in the Foster Bldg.

Mr. Powers was first assistant corporation counsel under Mayor Smith and was deputy attorney general under Frank Bennett. He was in charge of the fraud bureau in Utica.

He married Margaret C. Crave Sept. 25, 1918, in St. Francis de Sales Church. She was a communicant of Our Lady of Lourdes Church.

Mr. Powers was a life-long Democrat and a member of the Oneida County Democratic Club. He was a member of Utica Council 189, Knights of Columbus and BPOE 33.

He leaves his wife; several nieces and nephews.

The funeral will be at 8:30, Monday, from the Langdon Residential Funeral Home, York and Maple Sts., and from Our Lady of Lourdes Church at 9, where a solemn requiem high Mass will be celebrated. Burial will be in Mt. Olivet Cemetery, Whitesboro.

Harry J. McDaniel at 75; Sherburne News Publisher Dies at Age 73

Norwich (AP)—Harry J. McDaniel, 75, a newspaperman for 56 years, died Aug. 13, 1958, in Chenango Memorial Hospital after suffering a heart attack earlier in the day.

He formerly was editor and publisher of the weekly Sherburne News.

McDaniel was a Republican state committeeman from Chenango County for many years until his replacement three years ago.

A son now operates the newspaper.

In 1944 he married Patricia Connelly and had resided in Alexandria for the past nine years. He was a carpenter. Mr. Desgrousselier was a veteran of World War II serving in the Army Air Corp. including three years in Europe.



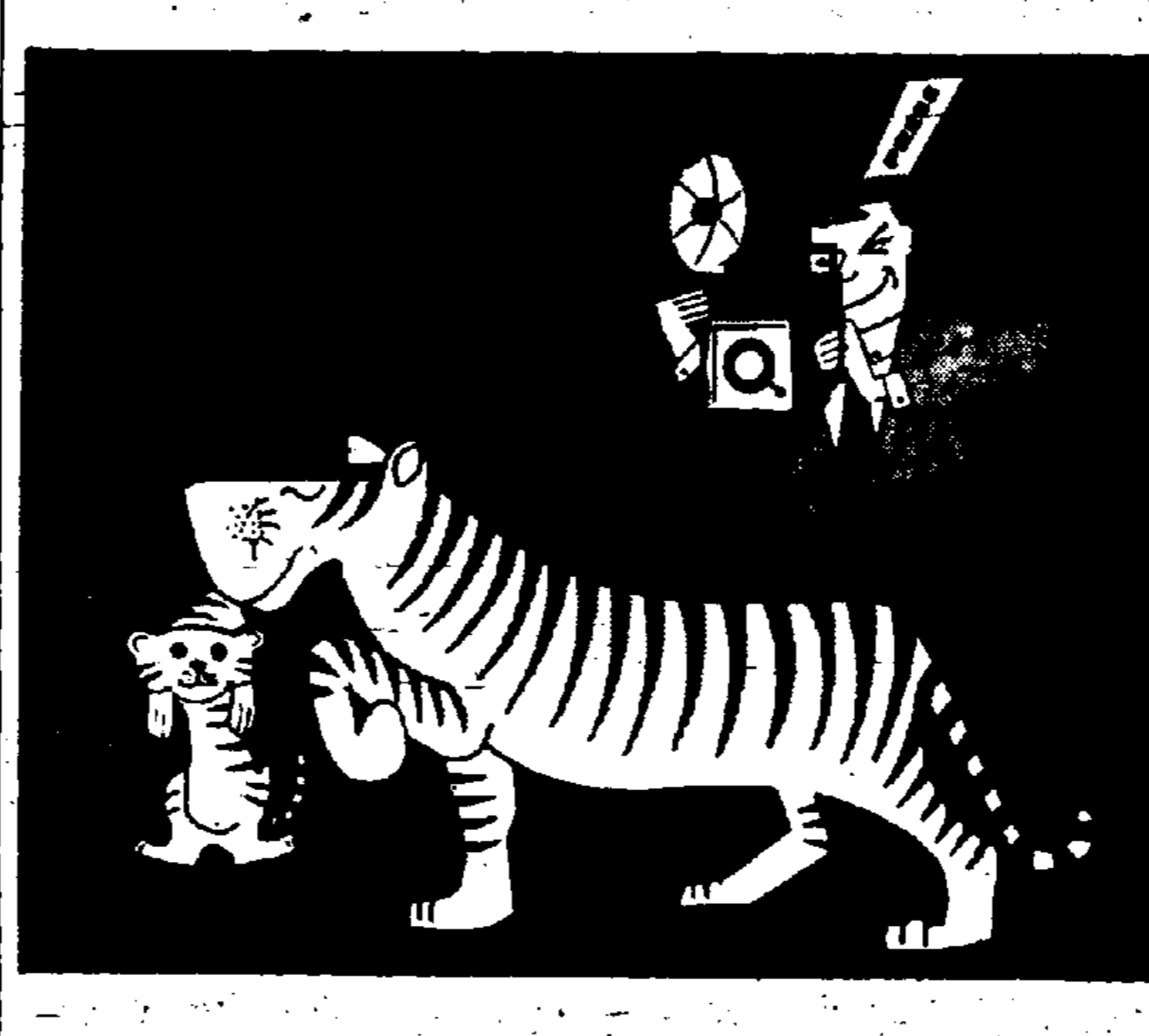
