WOMAN SLAIN BY BULLET OF RIFLE AT CAMP

Accident on Lake Delta, Near Rome

Mrs. James T. Dunn Victim of Accident on Lake Delta, Near Rome

ROME, Sept. 4.—There was a fatal accident about 4:30 o'clock this afternoon at the camp of James T. Dunn, 4 1/2 mile south of Kettle Hill, when Mrs. James T. Dunn was killed by a bullet fired from a 12-calibre rifle by Milton Pepper, son of Mr. and Mrs. John P. Pepper, of 406 Kent Street. Both families live in the village of Edward Easton.

At the time of the accident Mr. Dunn and Mr. Pepper were in the cottage on the shore of Lake Delta. Mrs. Dunn, aged about 35 years, had been sitting on the bank of the lake. The Pepper boy and two of the sons of Mr. and Mrs. Dunn, Leonard and William, were in the rear of the cottage. The Pepper boy had to fire and was said to have been sitting at a target.

The Dunn boy declared to his companions that he could shoot through a keyhole of a shed adjoining the cottage. The next instant a bullet struck through the door and into the cottage. The Pepper boy was seen to be screaming. Horace Leonard, a brother, was also summoned to the hospital.

The Pepper camp was completed 4 1/2 miles from the shore of Lake Delta. The Dunn family had been in the cottage for several years. Mrs. Dunn's maiden name was Mrs. W. J. Dunn. She was born in Ontario, Canada, about 20 years ago, and was married here in 1915. She was a member of the Roman Catholic Church and was a promoter of the Roman Catholic Society. Besides the husband, Mrs. Dunn is survived by eight children, Margaret, Mrs. W. J. Dunn, James, Mrs. W. J. Dunn, and three sons, Mrs. Levi Sabourin of Kempton, Canada; Mrs. G. A. Deuster and W. Thomas Sabourin of Ottawa, Ontario. The Dunn family brother lived in the World War in France.

FATALLY HURT WHEN DOOR OF CAR FLIES OFF

H. Storrs Bowen Dodges Collision But is Killed in Unusual Accident

After dodging two cars rushing into a collision at the corner of James and Nelson streets, where he had waited a street car, H. Storrs Bowen suffered a fractured skull at 1 o'clock Saturday afternoon when hit in the head by a door flying from one of the cars, and died two hours later in the General Hospital.

Allen Curtis of Madison drove an automobile going south on Nelson street which collided with a delivery truck going east on James street, driven by Anthony Nadeo of 1811 Morris street, the door from the truck flying off as that machine swerved to the curb and crashed against a telephone pole.

Dr. H. W. Thomson, coroner, questioned the driver of the car and was convinced that neither was in any way responsible for the death of Mr. Bowen. The young men were taken to police headquarters and afterward released.


