ADJOURNMENT OF HEARING EXPECTED

Postponement of Schuyler Street Crossing Elimination Case Anticipated

Question of Half Way Bridge Still Up in Air, Says City Engineer

Probability of an adjournment on the Schuyler Street grade elimination crossing, which is scheduled for a hearing by the Public Service Commission Thursday afternoon, was indicated Tuesday by City Engineer Richard S. Cookinham.

Some answer on the Turner Street elimination is anticipated by the city engineer, who said plans would be presented by both the railroad and the city. The railroad plan is characterized as less "expensive" than the city's.

On the eve of the Public Service Commission hearings, the halfway bridge question is still as much of an enigma as ever. When brought before the commission in May, the railroad's plan for removal was adopted to allow the city to determine its position in the matter.

Claims of a "gentleman's agreement" whereby the city would pay the railroad's share of the removal were made at the hearing, but the present administration has made no statement concerning any such agreement since that time.

Tangled in the question of removing the bridge is the problem of building up the D. & W. street under the bridge. Utica has said nothing concerning the spur removal, although the village of Yorkville has served notice on the railroad to remove the tracks by July 1.

It is possible the Public Service Commission will decide the entire halfway bridge question out of its jurisdiction, allowing the city and the railroad company to settle the matter between themselves. It is generally conceded the railroad would not remove its tracks without carrying the matter to the courts.

Although plans of an "ambitious" nature have been prepared by the department for the elimination of the Schuyler Street crossing by building an overhead crossing from the foot of State Street across the tracks of the railroads, Engineer Cookinham said the matter probably be adjourned Thursday to allow more time for study.

The question is further involved by the encroachment of private property on State Street between Lafayette and Ontario streets. An ordinance, offered by Alderman Thomas at a recent Common Council meeting, requests the corporation to report on this matter and the report is expected at the next council meeting.

TALKS TO INVESTORS

Governor, in Radio Address, Warns Against High-Bounding Stock Circulata

In his address on the subject of stock offered by mail, delivered by radio Tuesday night from Station WUTV, W. E. Governor, manager of the Better Business Bureau, said in part: "The use of the United States mails by sellers of doubtful securities is becoming more and more prevalent. The so-called 'Blue Sky' laws in many of our states have made it so difficult for this country to ply their trade by personal solicitation that this practice has been resorted to in a last resort rather than as a preference on their part."

"Most of these issues are highly speculative, and not a few are actually worthless. If you have been the victim of a stock selling scheme in the past, no doubt you are receiving from time to time letters and circulars describing in lurid and exciting phrases some get-rich-quick scheme or other."

"The sellers try their best to allay any suspicions you may have and to induce you to send your money to them as soon as possible after the receipt of their offer. They do not want you to investigate. They know that for their purpose a snap judgment, influenced by their highly colored paragraphs, is much better than a judgment which is the product of careful consideration and investigation."
