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Stock Market Scores Sharp Gain More Than 100 Issues Hit Peak

New York — The stock market scored one of the sharpest gains in recent years yesterday. People demanded stocks and were willing to pay as much as \$5 a share or so over Tuesday's closing prices to get what they hoped would be more than 100 issues that peaked at peak prices for 1950.

The breadth of the advance was a surprise even to the most bullish-minded traders. Tuesday's market declined over a wide front Friday before the Christmas holidays. The decline evidently attracted a rush of bargain hunters and others looking for a spot in which to invest their money.

Yesterday's rise in average was the steepest since December, 1946, although matched once since then in all stocks listed on the exchange, increased by more than \$1 a billion.

At the final bell the general level of prices, as measured by the Associated Press average of 60 stocks, was at the highest level since February, 1951.

AN INTERESTING angle to the market was the unusually wide range of interest shown by traders — the so-called blue-chip, or top-grade issues were just as much in demand as numerous stocks with a more or less speculative rating.

Among the most popular groups were rails, steel, oil, airlines, motor and aircraft manufacturing stocks.

War-baby stocks figured prominently in the advance as well as many with a strong peace flavor. Buying orders rolled into the exchange, not in fits and starts, but in a steady impressive flow. Sales piled out to 2,930,000 shares from 2,660,000 Tuesday. It was the thirteenth full session in a row in which volume has topped the 2-million-share mark.

The Associated Press 60-stock average jumped \$1.70 a share to \$87.80. Each of the three major stock groupings, industrials, rails and utilities, made an excellent showing.

Gains were posted for 901 of the 1,184 individual stocks traded, an unusually high ratio. Only 136 declined.

Wall Street is doing a little head-batting on the problem of where the money is coming from. Investment trusts are frequently mentioned as strong buyers, and other institutional buyers also seem to be coming into the market on a larger scale.

A large source of investment funds, too, has been created by the extraordinarily lavish run of dividends which has been pouring out of corporate tills in recent weeks.

In the rail section N. Y. Central stood out with a rise of \$1 at \$21.75 and Chesapeake & Ohio up as much as 35¢.
