

**DEATH TAKES THOS. J. PRYOR AFTER EXTENDED ILLNESS**

Thomas J. Pryor, 75, a well known resident of Kirkland, died Tuesday in a Utica hospital following a long illness. He was born in Kirkland April 27, 1855, son of the late James and Margaret Pryor, where practically all of his life was spent.

Mr. Pryor was a farmer and a carpenter. He was a member of St. Mary's Church of this village and of the Holy Name Society.

He married Harriet Crane of College Hill, who died about four years ago.

"The Perfect Life" will be the topic of the pastor's sermon next Sunday morning.

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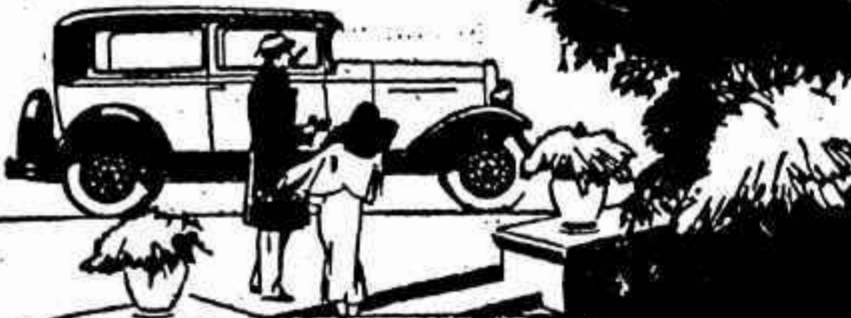
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
