CLINTON RED CROSS HAS ANNUAL MEETING

The annual meeting of the Clinton Branch of the American Red Cross was held in the Kirkland Town Library Wednesday afternoon. The following officers were elected to serve for the ensuing year: Chairman, Mrs. A. E. Swartwout; vice chairman, Mrs. M. A. Weber; secretary, Miss Marion Carlyon; treasurer, Mrs. R. O. Barber; advisory committee, Mrs. C. L. Lewis, Mrs. H. W. Allen, Mrs. J. J. Sinnott, Mrs. G. A. Watrous, Miss Helen Taylor; chairman of disaster committee, J. W. Delahunt; chairman Junior Red Cross, Miss Mildred Prettyman. The nominating committee was composed of Mrs. A. W. Scoones, Edward W. Stanley, and Mrs. W. M. Carruth.

The reports of the various officers for the past year were read. That of the chairman, Mrs. A. E. Swartwout, included a statement of the activities of the branch since the last annual meeting. Particular mention was made of the rumor leading to the inspection of the flour stored in the town hall in charge of the local welfare office. Mrs. Swartwout stated that a committee investigated the matter and discovered no grounds for the charge that the flour had been allowed to spoil and was being wasted.

The report of Mrs. R. O. Barber, treasurer of the Branch, showed total receipts of \$1,033.75, and disbursements of \$714.04, leaving a balance on hand of \$319.71. Particular mention of an anonymous contribution of \$10 for the Red Cross earthquake fund was made.

Mrs. Harold W. Allen, chairman of the nutrition committee, reported that a total of 2,181 quarts of milk had been distributed to needy families, which was 33 less than the previous year. 85 school children were supplied with milk, 16 of whom received it without cost.
